

Financial highlights



Our program at New Destiny Treatment Center has had an outstanding success rate. More than 60 percent of our clients not only complete the nine month residence program, they also enjoy a new life free from alcohol and other drugs.

Prior to 2004, we received significant amounts of reimbursements from Medicaid funds (for our clients' medical care and counseling). These funds used to provide more than 70 percent of our operating budget (which remains at approximately \$100,000 per month, or \$1.2 million per year).

Today, although we still receive some funding from ODADAS and other government sources, the majority of our funding comes from donations by individuals, churches and other groups. We have opened three New Destinations Thrift Stores and the net proceeds from these go to help support New Destiny. We also are asking our clients and their families to help pay for some of their treatment (based upon their ability to pay) and local referring courts to help cover the costs of the men that they send to us in lieu of serving time in jail/prison. In addition, we have begun to provide outpatient services, such as suboxone treatment, to provide additional funding to our ministry as well.

However, as mentioned above, the majority of our funding must come from the donations by individuals, churches and other groups. New Destinations Thrift Stores

The year 2006 was a period of growth for New Destinations Thrift Stores. There are now three locations working to bring revenue and recognition to New Destiny. The Wooster location opened in May 2006. It was followed by the opening of the Massillon store in July. These stores join the Barberton store, which opened in 2005. These stores represent more than 30,000 square feet of retail space full of clothing, household goods, furniture and more. Nearly 100 volunteers assist the stores in accomplishing the goal of raising funds and awareness for the treatment of chemically dependent men.

From the director

The New Destiny Treatment Center was born out of a vision of rescuing men from a life of alcoholism and addictions. We have found that this lifestyle has no respect for age, race or gender. Anyone apart from Christ is susceptible to being lured into a life of addiction.



From the conception of NDTC, the motto has been, "Our only treatment is abstinence, and our only cure is Christ." Our staff daily stresses the importance of a strong spiritual life.

Our clientele age range is becoming much younger as each year passes. The average age served at NDTC is now 36. The clients are in great need. In addition to quality, faith focused treatment, we make sure that they have other necessary supports. These include education, vocational training, social support and family reconciliation. They all receive training in how to take care of themselves and how to live in reality without the use of drugs or alcohol.



Problems associated with an individual's alcoholism or drug addiction can vary significantly. Many suffer from mental health, occupational, physical or social problems that make their addictive disorders much more difficult to treat. Our trained, qualified staff members are well-prepared to assist these men in overcoming additional issues as well as their addictions.

The Lord has been doing mighty works at NDTC. He has sent wonderful volunteers who selflessly share their resources and continue to lift our programs and men in prayer. We are grateful for all that is done for us. Returning husbands to wives, fathers to children and sons to parents is difficult work and can't be done alone. Thank you for all that you have done to continue this good work.

Holistic services

The New Destiny Treatment Center provides residential treatment services for chemically dependent adult males and outpatient treatment services for adolescents, and adult males and females. The treatment program is certified by the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS).

The program services include didactic classes, therapy, educational training, and other miscellaneous services.

Didactic classes:

- Psycho-social education
- Substance abuse education
- Twelve steps
- Spiritual formation

Therapy:

- Individual counseling
- Group counseling
- Family counseling

Educational training:

- Basic education skills
- GED readiness
- Computer literacy

Support services:

- Case management
- Medical (nursing/physician) services
- Drug testing
- Recreation
- Transportation



2006 program usage

A total of 131 clients were served during 2006 (including those who entered treatment the previous year, as well as those who will complete treatment after 2006.)

The approximate breakdown of services per month for each client includes:

- 40 hours of group counseling
- 4 hours of individual counseling
- 64 hours of didactic classes
- 12 hours of medical services
- 18 hours of exercise/recreation
- 28 chapel services
- 336 meals

Other Highlights:

Two clients passed the state exam for their GED diplomas. One of these clients received special honors to recognize his performance on the exam.



Special opportunities for the spiritual enrichment of the clients included an overnight men's retreat in Marengo, Ohio, and a week of special religious services by guest speaker Rev. Gary Brugger from Marion, Ohio.

75 clients, family members, volunteers and staff attended the annual Family Picnic held in July. All attendees had a good time as they enjoyed music, games, and food.

Forty-seven children were served by the Dads Still Care program. Dads Still Care purchases gifts for New Destiny dads to present to their children at Christmas.
